

PREFACE

AILA's Immigration Forms Toolbox was first published in 2013, designed to replace *AILA's Forms & Fundamentals*, and to focus solely on key agency forms used in the everyday practice of a general immigration law office. The *Toolbox* is intended to serve as a daily reference tool for all practitioners who seek assistance and expertise in completing these most important forms. The various authors who graciously contributed to this project provide both their expert advice on how to fill out key forms, as well as explanations and other practice tips concerning the immigration benefit addressed by the forms.

The articles and their accompanying sample forms are organized by agency and include, among other topics:

- Completing important DHS-USCIS-generated forms such as the G-325, I-9, I-129, I-130, I-131, I-140, I-485 and new I-485, Supplement J, I-539, I-589, I-601, I-601A, I-765, I-864, and the N-400
- Completing important EOIR- and DOL-generated forms such as the EOIR 26, 27, 28, 29, 33, 42A, 42B, and the ETA-9035
- and many more

As readers of this publication are likely aware, several of the agencies—most notably USCIS—have made numerous, recent changes to the various forms used in the day-to-day practice of immigration law, including changes to the forms themselves, as well as changes to both filing fees and filing locations.
